

Fragmented research landscape





Political Communication Cultures in Western Europe is a comparative study wich aims at analysing the relationship between political elites and the media in seven Western European contries.


The objective is to investigate the attitudes, norms and values that drive the relationship between political actors and journalists and thereby detect the underlying patterns of political communication behaviors in Western democracies. Taken together, these orientations can be summarised as **Political Communication Culture** of a country.



In the first phase of the project, surveys will be carried out in seven Western European countries: Austria, Denmark, Finland, Germany, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland. In a second phase, surveys are planned in France, Italy, and the United Kingdom.

The project is carried out under the auspices of the EUROCORES ECRP 2006 Programme. Funding is provided by the respective national research councils of the participating countries.

EUROCORES networking and dissemination - why?



Networking activities allow CRPs to work together for synergy and added value

- Programme coherence
- Programme visibility

Long-term objectives:

- •To strengthen the field (capacity building)
- •To discover new science horizons (creating perspective)



EUROCORES networking and dissemination – why? (2)

Programme coherence

- Can promote synergies between funded CRPs
- Possible to explore aspects of the programme from the Call not covered by the main research foci of the selected CRPs (e.g. by forging links with investigators from recommended but not funded projects)



EUROCORES networking and dissemination – why? (3)

Programme visibility

- Raising awareness of and disseminating results
- Promoting the contribution of the field to wider areas of participating disciplines or other areas of knowledge
- Promoting interdisciplinary approaches
- Promoting the field in countries not participating in HumVIB
- Promoting the benefits of international research collaboration



EUROCORES networking and dissemination – what?

Networking activities

- Science meetings: working groups, seminars, workshops, symposia, conferences
- Summer Schools
- Training programmes/specialized courses
- HumVIB sessions at larger events
- Short-term research visits

Can be stand-alone events or part of larger events when co-organising.

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EUROCORES networking and dissemination – what?

Dissemination activities

- Publications, working papers, brochures, posters, exhibition stands
- Invited sessions at larger events (when not co-organizing)
- Dissemination travel grants to promote EUROCORES and publicize HumVIB programme



EUROCORES networking and dissemination – conditions?

- Supports inter-CRP (or inter-EUROCORES) networking only
- Co-funding/co-sponsorship encouraged
- Primarily for scientific meetings, not management
- Involvement of junior members encouraged
- Minimum 2 CRPs involved (€15-25K for workshop)
- Financial/logistical responsibility of local organizer
- Contributions to "PR" material required



EUROCORES networking and dissemination – how?

- "Light-weight application" (draft verified with Coordinator, online application, 2/3 months in advance)
- Scientific Committee discusses merit, suggests changes
- Final decision with ESF
- Acceptance form
- Payments (80-20%)
- Acknowledgements
- Scientific & financial report



EUROCORES programme structure and management

- Management Committee overall governance
- Review Panel scientific monitoring
- Scientific Committee networking coordination



Scientific Committee

Composed of:

- Project Leaders of CRPs
- ESF representative (EUROCORES Programme Coordinator)
- A scientific member appointed by ESF (optional)



- Chair nominated by ESF from committee membership
- ESF provides secretariat to the Scientific Committee (through the EUROCORES Programme Coordinator)
- Relevant ESF Head of Unit and Management Committee may also attend Scientific Committee and other networking meetings



Scientific Committee (3)

Mandate

- Responsible for agreeing on the networking policy of the EUROCORES programme (evaluating proposals from Principal Investigators)
- Provides scientific guidance and coordination to the CRP
- Reports to the Management Committee (through the EUROCORES Programme Coordinator)



Scientific Committee (4)

- Meets once per year (normally)
- Members represent the Principal Investigators, Associated Partners and Project Members of a CRP and are responsible for communication flow between Scientific Committee to Principal Investigators, Associated Partners and Project Members.



EUROCORES reporting

To ESF:

Light reporting burden (per CRP):

- Annual report
- Final report three months after conclusion of project

To national funding organisations

• Varies according to EFO
