## **Main Objectives and Framework debate**

Interculturalism, a policy strategy favoured for some years by the Council of Europe, continues to be a rising force in European diversity debates, especially in these times of policy uncertainty and the so-called "crisis of state multiculturalism". The main purpose of this Exploratory Workshop is to identify the main contours of this policy concept and assess its foundations and policy implications. The goal is to interrogate whether Interculturalism marks a policy paradigm shift or whether it is simply a variant within the existing repertoire of diversity policy concepts and approaches.

This Exploratory WS seeks to map these discussions by identifying and engaging with the normative foundations of intercultural policies. There are clearly different strands of this concept, from a contractual approach to the national identity/diversity nexus, to a view centred on cohesion and social conflicts, to a diversity advantage approach, which emphasises creativity, seeing diversity as a resource for innovation through interaction. Hence the importance of the conceptual task that we are proposing. Interculturalism has achieved a certain visibility, even prominence in certain parts of Europe and in certain policy domains such that it is urgently in need of intellectual interrogation if the concept is to be of value.

In the current debate on diversity, we wish to bring together European scholars working on diversity policies, citizenship studies and migration research to examine this policy-based and under-theorised concept. Is it the case, as practitioners of interculturalist policies suggest that these policies further debate on diversity, enhance cohesion in urban contexts, social development and reduce xenophobia and the growing intolerant populism? The Exploratory WS has the potential for opening lines of analysis and research at different levels. Firstly, the in-depth exploration of interculturality as a normative concept; secondly, its operationalisation as a policy or forms of sociality, especially at the local level. Thirdly, a comparative study of intercultural policies across Europe as well as in relation to other continents and contexts.

This workshop is a complementary action for DIVERSIDAD project, on Municipalities and immigration: interculturality and the index of Governability, funded by the Spanish Ministry of Economy and Competitiveness. Ref.: CSO2011-28885.

## Report publication and dissemination

The ultimate objective of this Exploratory WS is to map out a European research agenda in relation to discourses of interculturalism. The WS brings together researchers in the field of postimmigration diversity and while we do not expect a uniform consensus, we do think it is feasible to achieve through discussion a shared, multi-faceted research agenda. Our principal output will be an edited book published by an academic press or a special issue in a peer-reviewed journal.
