Scientific Report on "Cultural Heritage Creative Tools and Archives workshop" (CHCTA), 26-27 June 2013, National Museum of Denmark, Copenhagen, Denmark, URL: <u>http://chcta.wordpress.com</u>

DIGHUMLAB Denmark, and the Digital Curation Unit Athens, ran a two-day workshop at the National Museum of Denmark, in Copenhagen, June 26-27, 2013 (Figures 1-4). There were approximately two-dozen presentations from around a dozen research organisations and European infrastructures, two invited international speakers (Professor Seamus Ross and Professor Julian Richards), and a final panel, which explored how research infrastructures dealing in digital cultural heritage could work more closely together. Various groups and future projects were kick-started from this workshop, including the ERCG, a panel submission at Digital Heritage 2013 in Marseilles, and a book project where all presenters were invited to contribute. We would like to thank NeDiMAH who provided 3000 euros in travel funding and the National Museum and DIGHUMLAB provided refreshments (coffee breaks and lunch).

2) Description of the scientific content of and discussions at the event (up to four pages)

The mandate of the workshop was as follows: "The workshop is open to all but we in particular invite participants drawn in the first instance from the <u>DARIAH</u>, <u>ARIADNE</u>, <u>CENDARI</u> and <u>NeDiMAH</u> and other EU cultural heritage networks. We envisage it will foster the growth of a community of practice in the field of digital heritage and digital humanities, leading to closer cooperation between participants and helping attendees

develop tools and methods that can be used by the wider community."

We had a very strong turnout of participants, including keynote presentations by Prof. Seamus Ross, the University of Toronto iSchool's Dean and Prof. Julian Richards, Professor at York University and Director of the Archaeology Data Service, and introducing innovative work from institutions and projects including: the Serious Games Interactive, the National Museum of Copenhagen, the Europeana Cloud project, DARIAH, DASISH, LARM, EHRI, ARIADNE, V-must (Virtual Museum Transnational Network), NEDIMAH, the Digital Curation Unit-Athena R.C., the Digital Repository of Ireland, and the Gunnerus Library in Trondheim (previously library of the Royal Norwegian Society of Sciences and Letters - DKNVS). We received about a dozen of pre-workshop papers, and we are impressed with the quality and range of the work presented.

On this basis, we intend turning some of these papers into an edited volume, organized around the following themes:

- a) scholarly information practices in cultural heritage
- b) requirements for digital tools and services
- c) corpora and digital collections
- e) digital infrastructures, architecture and tools
- f) digital cultural heritage, public communication and user experience, and
- g) policy issues in cultural heritage infrastructure research and development.

The volume will be one of the first bringing together perspectives from information behaviour and digital humanities research to the study of the fast evolving domain of digital research infrastructures in the arts and humanities. We expect it will have a readership in information science, digital heritage, archival science, and specialized programmes in postgraduate education and training, as well as in the professional and technical field of those involved in R&D and operational initiatives in the field of digital infrastructures, collection management systems, cultural heritage information systems, repositories, information systems, tools and services.

3) Assessment of the results and impact of the event on the future directions of the field (up to two pages)

### A short summary of the main impact of the funded initiative in prose form

Ashgate Publishing expressed interest in publishing a book with extended papers. A small group decided to form a panel to talk at Digital Heritage 2013 in Marseilles, 28 October to 1 November 2013. At least one presentation from the conference has already been approved for publication in a journal (Journal of Interactive Humanities). Two of the organizers were asked if they would keynote at a virtual heritage conference in Trondheim in September 2014. NeDiMAH has expressed interest in funding a further workshop in 2014.

### A more detailed discussion of the outcomes

In the final panel, representatives have agreed to attempt to share communication between research infrastructures, rather than work in isolation and possibly replicate what is already out there. The book will be an extension of the workshop, available via the Digital Humanities Series, and will be tied into thematic questions relation to more efficient and useful infrastructures for cultural heritage practitioners. The Journal of Cultural Heritage and Computing has also expressed interest in a summary article about the workshop. Also, *Europeana Cloud*, in the final panel presentation, outlined a new crossinfrastructure working group, *The Europeana Research Coordinators Group (ERCG)*. We quote from their blog post:

Panel participants Marnix van Berchum (DANS), Hans Jørgen Marker (DASISH) and Erik Champion (DARIAH) discussed the importance of Research Infrastructures, particularly in terms of the (re)use of European digital heritage. The question of what might be needed on a European level to further align the strategies of Research Infrastructures in the Social Sciences and Humanities was also considered.

These issues are important to the ERCG, which aims to position itself as a longterm forum for partnership between European Research Infrastructures. Over the course of the Europeana Cloud project, the ERGC will hold a series of virtual and in-person meetings. During these meetings, the ERCG will work towards more efficient and effective strategic positioning among its members and will raise awareness in the research community of the tools and services developed as part of Europeana Cloud.

The ERCG is coordinated by project partner <u>KNAW-DANS</u> and includes representatives from key European Research Infrastructures: <u>CENDARI</u>, <u>CLARIN ERIC</u>, <u>DARIAH</u>, <u>DASISH</u>, <u>EUDAT</u> and <u>OpenAIRE</u>.
